This is the sixty-eighth season of League football and, like many others, it has presented its share of highlights and a new crop of problems to be solved.

The unprecedented growth in popularity of our game, particularly in recent years, has brought with it a whole series of complex administrative situations, some of which have been met by the existing organisation, but many of which, I feel, require a completely new and broad outlook on the part of those responsible for management of the game.

During the early weeks of the season we enquired into an alleged breach of the now famous Coulter Law.

While the parties charged were completely exonerated, it became obvious that this particular League rule is inadequate to meet present-day requirements.

As a result, the League is at present reviewing all phases of the rule in an endeavour to provide a workable substitute. I believe that some provisions of the Coulter Law are excellent and should be retained, but others should be discarded or brought into line with modern conditions.

It is now history that the League announced plans in June for the construction of our future stadium at Waverley. I am confident that successive generations of football patrons will hail this move which will enable football affairs to be conducted with complete independence by future administrators.

As I have repeated so often, in so many places, the League has agreed for years that full expansion of the game in Melbourne can never be realised until football has a home of its own and the public can enjoy first-class accommodation and amenities.

I would be failing in my duty if I did not offer my wholehearted congratulations to the teams that have fought so hard to reach the Final Four.

It is a highly competitive sport that requires more than 13 wins in 18 matches to take part in the finals.

This has been brought about by the failure of lower clubs, which were eliminated from Final Four chances early in the season.

This uneven competition is another aspect of our game which requires close consideration.

I realise that there are several solutions to the problem, none, however, readily acceptable to all clubs.

Finally, I would like to pay tribute to all loyal supporters of our code, who have once again braved the elements to attend this year's matches. The weather has been cold and often wet, and this makes the contribution of all football followers so much more commendable.

Magpies 100th Finals' Game Today

Collingwood reaches a notable milestone in the club's distinguished history today. The 1964 Grand Final will be the 100th final series game in which the Magpies have appeared. They have a long lead over all the other clubs.

Carlton have played in 70, Essendon in 69, Melbourne 52, Fitzroy 47, Richmond 44, Geelong 42, South Melbourne 38, Footscray 15, St. Kilda 11, and North Melbourne and Hawthorn eight.

The Magpies have won 13 flags and been runners-up 16 times. Their opponents today have been premiers 11 times, and runners-up on three occasions.

Collingwood and Melbourne have met 145 times and the Magpies lead 89-53. Three games were drawn.

Though the Demons trail in overall games, Grand Final-wise their record against Collingwood is more impressive.

In six Grand Final clashes, the Magpies have posted only one win, in the famous 1958 battle, when Melbourne's string of premiership victories was abruptly ended by a team of fanatical opponents.

That game is still a strong talking point with the football public, and following last week's remarkable comeback by the Magpies against Geelong, everyone is asking: Can it be done again?

Though the present side is vastly different to the 1958 line-up which

stopped Melbourne from equalling Collingwood's proud record of four successive flags (1927-8-9-30), the spirit is similar, and this has always been one of the Magpies' greatest strengths.

After the debacle of a fortnight ago, Collingwood have readjusted themselves "overnight" and today's team will "die" trying to bring home Collingwood's 14th League pennant.

Last Saturday Collingwood chose rover Dennis Dalton for his first full senior game, and it is interesting to recall other players who made their debut in a final, in latter years.

In 1961 Barry Ion broke into Footscray's side for his first full game in the preliminary final against Melbourne, and a week later played in the Grand Final against Hawthorn.

Also in 1961, Mike Collins played with Melbourne in the second semi-final against Hawthorn. It was his first full game.

Others include Carlton's Maurie Sankey in the 1959 preliminary final and Vin Williams of Fitzroy in the 1952 first semi-final.

Apart from Dalton, team mate Kevin Rose also made his debut in a preliminary final in 1958

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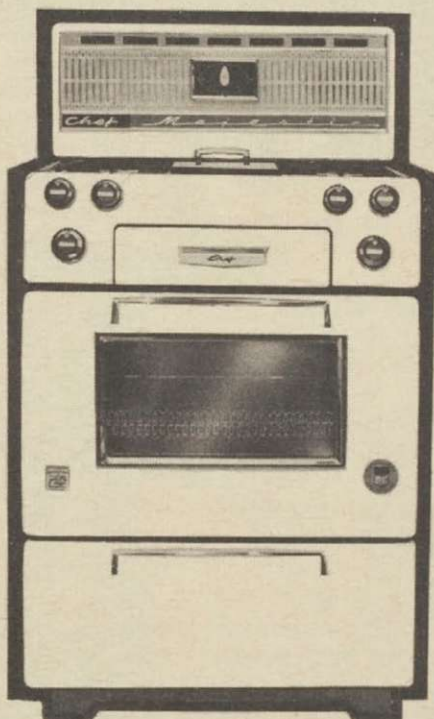

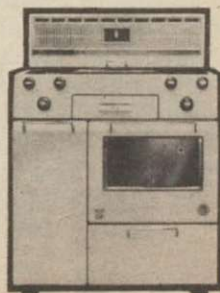

Copeland and Truscott Trophy Winners

Two highly-prized club awards in League football are the E. W. Copeland Trophy and the "Bluey" Truscott Cup. They are the best and fairest trophies of the clubs playing today.

The Copeland Trophy is Collingwood's award and was first presented in 1927. It was won by former captain Syd Coventry, who also won the Brownlow Medal that year.

The Truscott Cup is donated to Melbourne by famous coach, "Checker" Hughes, in memory of former player and war hero, Keith Truscott. It was first awarded in 1943, and was also won by a Brownlow Medallist, Don Cordner.

HUGH BUGGY *recalls*

Melbourne has inflicted some shattering defeats on Collingwood in the League finals. The Demons' total of 19-20 against the Magpies in the second semi-final is not their record against Collingwood.

In the preliminary final of 1948 Melbourne ran up 25.16, the record for any final series match, to Collingwood 15.11.

In the 1956 Grand Final the Demons amassed 17.19 to Collingwood 6.12 and in the 1939 Grand Final Melbourne totted up 21.22 to Collingwood 14.11.

As far back as 1926 Melbourne won its second premiership by overwhelming the Magpies in the Grand Final by 17.17 to 0.8.

That total remained a Grand Final record for eleven years, until Geelong kicked 18.14 to Collingwood 12.18 in the Grand Final of 1937.

A stand-up fight in the centre of the field touched off one of the ugliest incidents seen in a League Grand Final in 1910.

No quarter was given or asked in that Carlton-Collingwood clash.

Thirty barrackers jumped the fence, and a few thousand more were about to follow them.

Trainers, policemen, players, small boys, and dogs were mingled in a mad whirl.

That great umpire, **Jack Elder**, described it as the ugliest scene he could recall in seventeen years of umpiring finals. The ball was forgotten and a mad melee seemed certain.

Elder dashed among the scuffling players and pulled two fighting pairs apart. Then he blew his whistle, grabbed the ball and bounced it.

"An umpire's whistle," wrote one commentator, "saved more than 40,000 people from witnessing a pitched battle."

* * * *

Geelong, a superbly trained and confident side with sparkling pace that no rival could equal, gained its first double premiership in 1951-2, after 55 years in the League.

Again and again Geelong outpaced other League teams which thought they had found a plan to frustrate the Cats' pace.

With quick movers and thinkers on every line Geelong was cer-

tainly the fastest League side seen since the war, and good judges rated it the fastest since South Melbourne's "Foreign Legion" side of 1932-36.

Skipper **Fred Flanagan** and **Bob Davis**, one of the most fleet-footed big men seen in the game, gave the half-forward line plenty of bite, and the midfielders, **Sid Tate**, **Leo Turner** and **Terry Fulton** in 1951, and **Bert Worner**, **Doug Palmer** and **Fulton** in 1952, gave the club two centre lines with dazzling pace.

A well-conceived strategical plan to which players conformed perfectly gave Carlton its sixth premiership in 1938.

The Blues decided to rock Collingwood in the Grand Final by playing the long game consistently.

Paul Schmidt and **Harry Vallenge** were told to play very wide on the half-forward flanks, with attacks to be directed through centre half-forward, **Jack Wrouth**.

Full-forward **Ken Baxter** was told to stay in the goal square to deprive the Magpies' great full-back, **Jack Regan**, of the run he needed for his soaring marks.

It was known to Carlton that **Albert Collier** was carrying a leg injury. To ensure that he would stay on the field, Carlton players were directed not to bump him and to keep free of him as much as possible.

In a violent collision between two physically strong sides the Blues smashed a late Collingwood rally to win by 15.10 to 13.7.

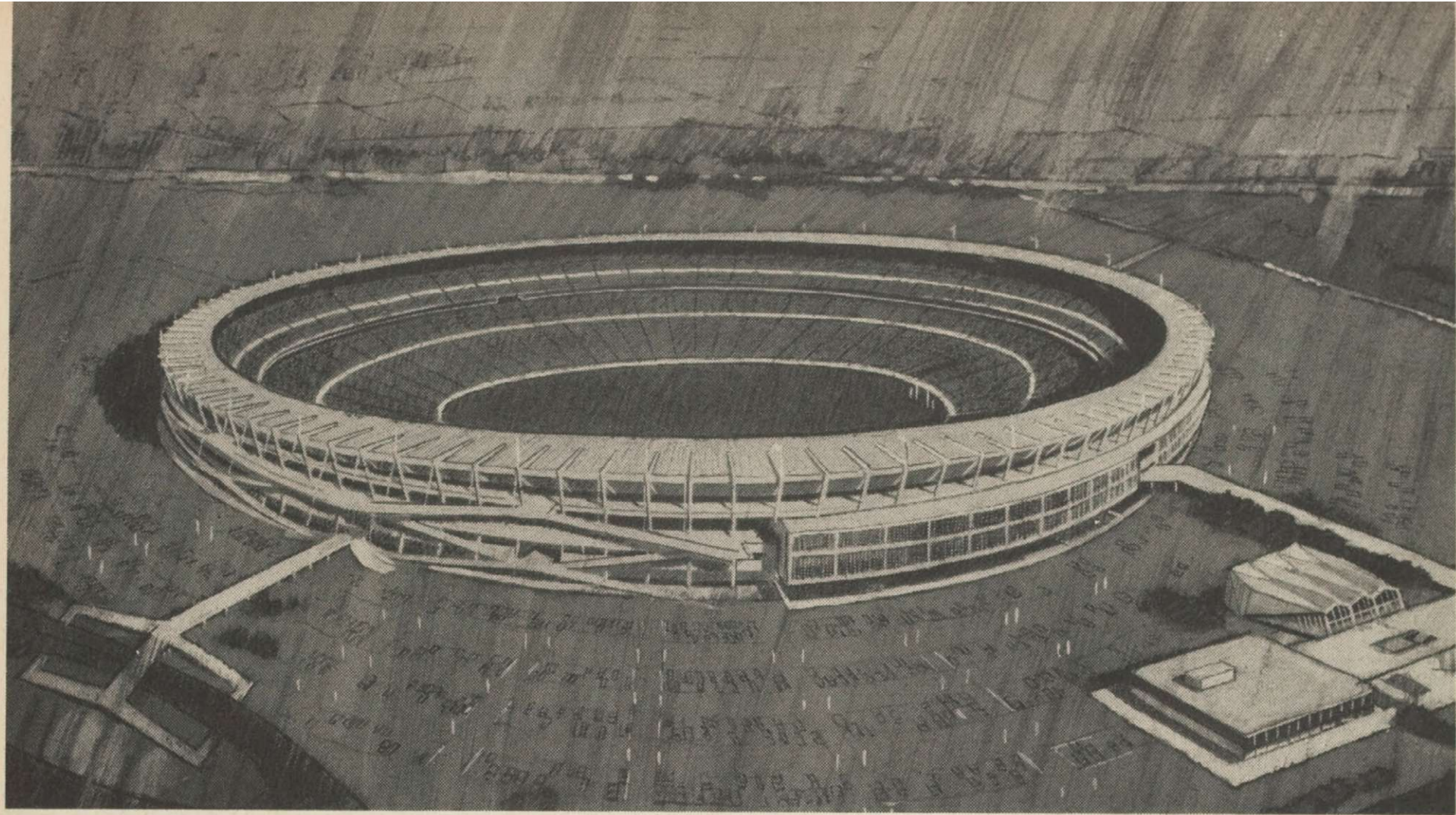

The main stadium will accommodate 166,648 and facilities will include a general sports centre, two ancillary ovals and a modern bus terminal.

WAVERLEY WILL CATER FOR ALL

When the V.F.L. Stadium at Waverley is completed, it will be the largest sporting arena in the English-speaking world. Here are a few features of the proposed structure:

- The playing surface, 220 yards long and 173 yards wide, will be specially developed so that the game will be as unaffected as possible by wet weather.

- Total capacity will be 168,000 people—sufficient for any League fixture.

From three levels, the public will be able to enjoy the game in spacious comfort, served by the finest amenities.

- The view of the arena will be completely unobstructed by pillars and the stadium will be available for use at night. The playing area will be ablaze from powerful lighting located in banks on the cantilever roof.

- There will be accommodation for 10,000 ground members on two levels in the members' section.

- Bars, lounge bars, snack bars and rest room, each giving a view of the arena, will be provided.

- The site will be excavated to a depth of approximately 30 feet so that stands can be reached without climbing stairs.

- Four pedestrian ramps giving access to the stadium are to be built over the surrounding car park, which will accommodate 25,000 cars.

- The vast stadium will seat 126,000, including 10,000 in the members' enclosure.

A ring of private boxes completely encircling the stadium on the middle level will accommodate 2,200 patrons and ground members.

- Access to seating has been planned so that seated patrons will have their view as uninterrupted as little as possible by latecomers.

Scientific consideration of site lines will give a perfect view from every seat.

- Ticket booths will be placed under the overhang of the upper portion of the stand, so providing shelter to any queues that may form. However, automatic turnstiles will reduce queues to a minimum.

A pneumatic tube system will make it possible for tickets to be despatched instantly to any booth from a central station, eliminating delays for patrons picking up reserved seats.

HARRY BEITZEL SAYS:



Well, friends, the big day has at last arrived and by 5 o'clock tonight it will be mothballs for another six months.

It's been a great year for football and there have been many incidents to keep us on our toes.

Congratulations to both Melbourne and Collingwood upon reaching the grand final and re-creating history, as this season's final series have worked out identical to those back in 1955. In that year Collingwood won the toss for dressing rooms and chose the Melbourne rooms but the ground was an entirely different set-up. The Olympic stand, officially known as the Northern Stand was in the stage of being erected, the dressing rooms were in the middle of the outer stand used today by the reserve teams. Melbourne's own rooms were behind the goals at the Richmond or Punt Road end. Today these rooms are used by the umpires but in the mid-fifties the umpires stripped in the Test cricketers' room under the Grey Smith stand.

Incidentally, at 12.45 today the two umpires, probably **Ron Brophy** and **Jeff Crouch**, will be called together and informed by the chairman of the Umpires' Board, **Mr. Bernie Hogan**, which of them has been voted the honour of controlling the big game. Both will then move around to their dressing rooms and prepare for the game, after which the emergency umpire will don his track suit and dressing gown and walk around to the cricketers' rooms to view the match.

The 1955 grand final has become a famous match because of the Adams-Healy clash. "Bluey" was 19th man and he came dashing out from the outer wing position and ran straight into Des Healy and both were carried off the field. This is probably the record for the shortest time a reserve has spent on the field. The match also opened with an explosive clash in front of bay 10 when **Bobby Rose**, playing his last game for Collingwood, was met solidly by the Melbourne skipper **Noel McMahan**. It was an exciting match for three and a half quarters but then Melbourne's greater stamina enabled them to run out winners.

Rose typified his remarkable spirit and determination in that match in a last desperate effort to lift Collingwood with a "solo run" from the half back line to the forward line on the members' side, bouncing the ball five times but when he went to kick he was completely drained of energy and the ball travelled only 15 to 20 yards.

The match provided a magnificent individual effort by Collingwood's full back, **Jack Hamilton**, now Ass. Sec. of the V.F.L. Only 22 Have Umpired a League Grand Final

WHEN JEFF CROUCH was appointed to the Grand Final between Geelong and Hawthorn last year, he became the 22nd umpire to handle the "big game", in 67 years of League football.

Before the present system of playing finals was adopted in 1931, the premiership was decided 14 times without a Grand Final being played.

The record for the greatest number of Grand Finals umpired is seven, and is held by **Jack Elder** and **Bob Scott**.

Elder also umpired three play-off finals under the previous finals system, which didn't provide always for a Grand Final.

Jack McMurray Jnr. umpired six Grand Finals, including the 1948 re-play between Essendon and Melbourne.

His father had three Grand Finals and two play-off finals.

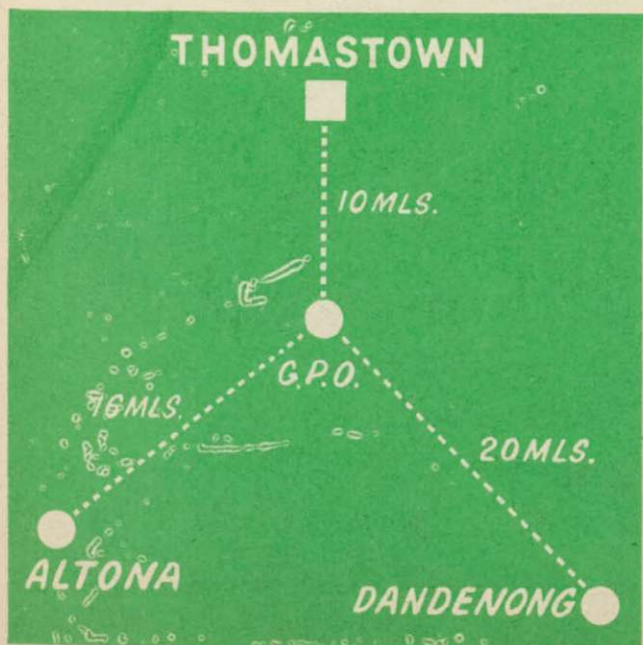

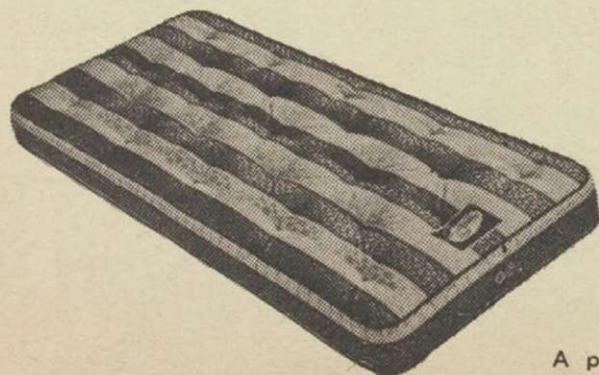

THE DEMONS

NORM SMITH.—Recruited from Dennis, a Sub-District League team, the present-day Demons' coach played 40 games with the Reserves side before graduating to the Firsts in 1935. He retired as a player with Melbourne in 1948 with 211 games and 540 goals to his credit. In 1949-50 he was captain-coach of Fitzroy, and in 1952 succeeded former champion centreman Alan La Fontaine as Demons' coach, where he has met with outstanding success over the past decade.

Ron Barassi (Captain)—One of the game's most famous players. Started with Melbourne in 1953, and has played 203 games.

Hassa Mann (Vice-captain)—Star centre man who shone in the second semi-final when switched to roving. From Rutherglen in 1959, 114 games.

Tassie Johnson—Former North Launceston (Tas.) player. He joined the Demons in 1959 after standing out for a season because of clearance trouble. Has 114 games to his credit.

Frank Adams—One of the fastest players seen in the League for years. Winger who has played in five premierships.

Tony Anderson—Courageous defender. In his second year after transferring from University Blacks. Victorian representative this year, 29 games.

Barry Bourke—Full-forward, originally from Neerim South. Started at Melbourne in the Under 19's and won his way into the senior side last year, 38 games.

Neil Crompton—Impressed in the second semi-final with a near faultless exhibition of back pocket play.

Brian Dixon—Outstanding winger with the Demons over the past decade. Tassie Medalist in 1961, has now played 190 games.

Peter McLean—Handy utility player, in his first season with Melbourne after transferring from amateur ranks, nine games.

Frank Davis—Half-back flanker who broke into the senior side against Hawthorn late in the year and has done remarkably well, six games.

Graeme Jacobs—A tall ruckman who is a dangerous player near goals. First-year player, 15 games.

John Lord—Brought back for the second semi-final after several weeks in the Reserves. Has proved a fine player for the Demons over the years, 116 games.

Ken Emselle—Rover, playing his third season of League football after winning promotion from the Under 19's.

Bryan Kenneally—Already has had six senior years experience, and only 22 years of age. Utility player with 96 games to his credit. Deputy vice-captain.

Bernie Massey—Regular full-back for the past three years. Held star Collingwood goal-kicker, Ian Graham, to one goal a fortnight ago, 68 games.

Brian Root—Determined centre half-back. Started with Melbourne in 1961, and has stated he intends to retire after today's game, 64 matches.

John Townsend—Played brilliantly in the second semi-final, earning the plaudits of the critics, who chose him almost unanimously as the best afield.

Barry Vagg—Elusive half-forward flanker, of the same mould as former star, Geoff Tunbridge. From Shepparton in 1962.

Don Williams—Has played in nearly every position this year and has excelled when it is considered he is back in League football after a break of four years, 149 games.

Graeme Wise—Greatly improved follower who has had a fine second season, after taking a while to settle into the tempo of League football, 21 games.

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THE MAGPIES

BOBBY ROSE (Coach).—His undoubted ability and knowledge of Australian Football is clearly indicated by his efforts this year in lifting the Magpies into the Grand Final in his first season as coach. Four times winner of the Copeland trophy, he was also runner-up for the Brownlow Medal in 1953 to Bill Hutchison.

Ray Gabelich (Captain)—A strong ruckman, now in the autumn of a fine career. First season as skipper, 131 games.

John Henderson (Vice-captain)—Centre man who has had a splendid year, winning interstate selection and being the Magpies' star in their two finals

Kevin McLean—Brought into the side last week, he capably held down the centre half-forward post against a strong opponent in Peter Walker of Geelong, 19 games.

Dennis Dalton—Played his first full game last week, after impressing in the Reserves side, and on four occasions when he came on as a reserve.

Dave Norman—Rover, who joined the Magpies after winning the Ballarat League best and fairest award in 1960.

Ken Turner—Has played the greater part of his career on a wing, but last week was switched to a back pocket when regular, Ron Reeves, reported unfit. 150 games.

Ian Graham—Rangy full-forward who is one of the top high marks in present-day football. Did well last week after an indifferent display in the second semi-final, 22 games.

John Mahon—Has done exceptionally well this year at centre half-back, where his courage and determination and strong playing ability has enabled him to beat many highly rated opponents, 51 games.

Trevor Steer—In his fourth season of League football, this lean follower joined the Magpies from University Blacks. Palms out to his rovers well

Laurie Hill—Did better last week when switched to his proper half-back flank. Being a left-footer, he was often caught out of position in the second

semi-final when played on the wrong flank. 45 games.

Ron Reeves—Injury kept this rugged, staunch-hearted back pocket out of the side last week. Former Victorian player, 111 games.

Ted Potter—Returned to the side last week after missing the second semi-final with an injured groin, and he certainly strengthened the defence, which was very lax in the previous game.

Max Urquhart—A "boom" player from Corowa last year. Played his 33rd game last week against Geelong in the preliminary final.

Kevin Rose—Ruck-rover who has played in various positions since first breaking into the senior side late in 1958, 96 games.

Mick Bone—Surprisingly omitted last week after playing in every game. When he came on after half-time he altered the whole complexion of the game

Terry Waters—Kicked 50 goals in his first year at Collingwood last year as a full-forward. Now playing in the ruck since Ian Graham "clicked" in the key forward post, 34 games.

Duncan Wright—Missed the first seven games this year, but has been in the side since.

Des Tuddenham—Solid half-forward flanker, recruited from Ballarat Y.C.W. in 1962.

Paul Wadham—Tall ruckman who is playing his first season in League football, and should develop with more experience, 16 games.

Bert Chapman—A product of the Under 19's side, he broke into Collingwood's senior team in 1960, and has now played in 48 games.

Ricky Watt—Seventeen-year-old winger who is playing his second season of League football.

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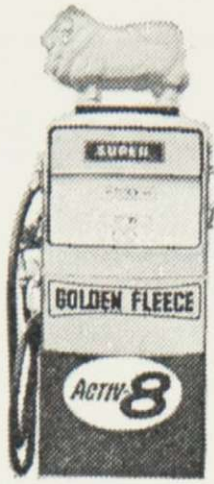
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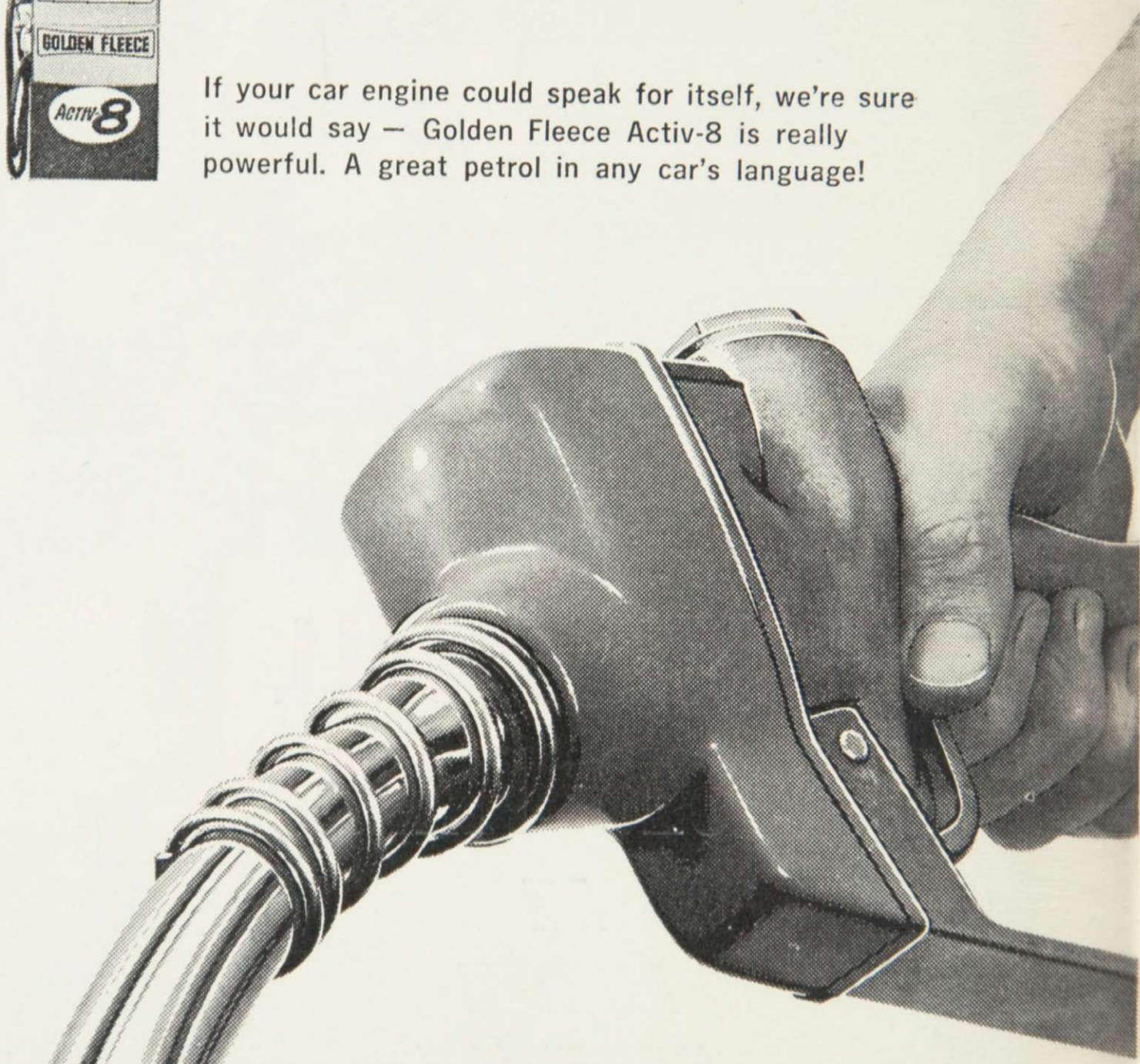
